Packers beat Chargers

GREENBAY, Wis. (AP)—Brett Favre's offseason work paid immediate dividends Thursday night in the Green Bay Packers' 10-7 preseason victory over the San Diego Chargers.

Favre, who trained with a strength and conditioning coach in the offseason for the first time, completed 9 of 10 passes for 91 yards, a touchdown and no interceptions in 1 1/2 quarters of work.

He guided Green Bay on an 80-yard scoring drive in the second quarter in which he completed 7 of 8 passes for 64 yards, capping the series with a 23-yard strike to Donald Driver and then jumping into the arms of his center, Mike Flanagan, who missed most of last season following a knee operation.

"We accomplished one goal: we went down the field and scored," Favre said at halftime of the game that was played in a steady drizzle.

"For the first preseason game, we played well and we should do well in certain areas.

"But we don't want to get too excited as we still have a lot of work to do."

Favre's revamped offensive line that lost stalwarts Marco Rivera and Mike Wahle to free agency, protected him well but didn't open many holes for Ahman Green, who carried eight times for 16 yards and had two of his team's six fumbles in the rain. Three were recovered by San Diego.

The Chargers didn't fumble at all. Philip Rivers' 34-yard touchdown pass to Willie Quinzie early in the third quarter tied it at 7.

Rivers completed 12 of 19 passes for 97 yards and no interceptions after replacing starter Drew Brees (2-for-5, 27 yards) to start the second quarter.

Nate Kaeding, who missed a 40-yard field goal attempt in overtime of the Chargers' playoff loss to the

New York Jets last season, blew three chances to put the Chargers ahead in the fourth quarter.

He was wide left from 45 yards and then wide right from 44 and 46 in the closing minutes.

J.T. O'Sullivan then drove the Packers to the Chargers 35, and Ryan Longwell kicked a 53-yard field goal—a field goal that barely cleared the crossbar with 33 seconds left.

Gordon to go both ways for KU

LAWRENCE (AP)—After puzzling for two years over whether to play Charles Gordon on offense or defense, Mark Mangino has made the only sensible choice.

He'll simply go ahead and play both ways. Kansas will line up the multitalented junior at wide receiver on some plays and cornerback on others.

He'll also return punts. Maybe it wouldn't hurt to let him play a little quarterback as well. He did, after all, throw a 26-yard touchdown pass last year against Texas Tech.

"He is just a phenomenal athlete," Mangino said Thursday at Kansas' annual media day. "I think we have a dilemma, a good dilemma if there is such a phrase."

The 5-foot-11, 180-pound California native is simply the most versatile football player in the Big 12, and possibly the nation. No one in the country exceeded his seven interceptions last year for a rugged Kansas defense that figures to be even better this year. It was the most interceptions by a Jayhawk since 1951.

He also led the Big 12 with eight pass breakups and averaged nine yards on 29 punt returns, including a 49-yarder in the victory over Kansas State.

On offense, he caught 15 passes, two for touchdowns.

Coaches puzzled all year over

where to use him. But now his role is finally defined — he will officially be asked to do everything but sell programs.

The trick — and this will test Mangino's judgment — will be getting him to do everything without wearing down.

"Where do we add reps and where do we reduce reps to help our team? That's the question that our staff is trying to answer," Mangino said. "We'll have to choose our battles."

His offensive talents were brought sharply into focus at practice the other day.

"He did not sit in an offensive position meeting during training camp yet," Mangino said. "Yet, he got in the huddle, heard the route and ran it perfectly and got open, and knew the adjustments to make against the coverage. That's a pretty special guy."

Whatever Mangino asks him to do is fine with Gordon, who also was a standout baseball player.

"God blessed me with good athletic ability, instincts, and I use them," he said. "There's a lot more expectations. But I'm just going to approach this season the same way I did last season, just go out and have fun playing football."

Introverted and shy, Gordon is never comfortable when the spotlight shines on him. Invited to accompany Mangino and a couple of teammates to Big 12 media day in

Houston last month, he declined.

"He's unbelievable," said defensive coordinator Bill Young. "Last year he threw a touchdown pass, he caught a touchdown pass. He returned kicks. He does it all, plus he's an outstanding defensive back."

"If you look at Charles, you wouldn't pick him out of a crowd. But if you get him on a football field, he's easy to find."

Gordon expects to spend most of his time on defense, as he did last year. But he'll have a voice in what he does.

"Coach takes that into consideration," he said. "If I feel I want to play receiver, he'll put me in. Basically, it's what our team needs at the time."

His teammates are not sure what he does best — catch passes or stop others from catching them.

"Whatever he likes to play," said wide receiver Mark Simmons. "I'm going to give the edge to wide receiver."

Quarterback Adam Barmann does not quite agree.

"Charles is just a great player," he said. "Charles is incredible. Whatever side of the ball he's on — offense, defense or special teams — he's going to make them better. I think he could be All-American at all three positions."

Of course, physical ability is not all he brings to the game. He also has a knack for recognizing formations and alerting teammates to what the opposition may be up to.

"When he's on offense and he's the slot receiver, he tells the quarterback, just by alignment, 'Here comes two off the edge, better get ready,'" Mangino said.

"When he's on the defensive side of the ball, he looks at the splits of the receivers and the formation and says, 'Here comes the post, here comes the corner route.'

"He helps you on one side and kills you on the other every day. He is a special young man."
