

Students, coaches worry about family

The devastation of hurricane Katrina is far-reaching with the Hagans. "My family plans to stay in impact felt by several Louisiana students currently enrolled at Colby Community College.

Seven students and two assistant basketball coaches are from the New Orleans area. Justin Brown (Kenner, La.), Autrail Manning (Marrero, La.), Hellion Knight (White Castle, La.) and Shedric Cole (New Orleans) are members of the men's basketball team. Assistant coaches Giang Phan and Vu Phan are also natives of New Orleans.

Brown's mother and two brothers evacuated to Houston, Tex. before the storm hit.

His dad stayed behind and was to Baton Rouge. He has talked with both parents.

"My dad has a lot of interesting stories to tell," said Brown. "My family hopes to return to New Orleans when it's possible."

Hagans' family is staying with family members in Shreveport.
