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Former leader of political group to talk

Schulz will speak at 7 p.m. in the Affairs Coun-Frahm Theater located in the Northwest Kansas Cultural Arts Center. Schulz was appointed Executive Director of Amnesty International (USA) in March 1994.

An ordained Unitarian Universalist minister, he began at Amnesty after serving for 15 years with the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations (UUA), the last eight (1985-93) as president of the

During his years with Amnesty he has traveled extensively, both in the U.S. and abroad.

Throughout his career he has been outspoken in his opposition to the death penalty and his support for women's rights, gay and lesbian rights and racial justice.

He has appeared frequently on radio and television, including "60 Minutes," "20/20," "The Today Show," "Good Morning America," "All Things Considered," "Talk of the Nation," "ABC World News," "Larry King Live," "Nightline," "Politically Incorrect," and on BBC,CNN,MSNBC,CNBC,FOX News and Bloomberg News.
