# Candidate tackles school finance issue

TOPEKA (AP) — Running for governor, Sen. Jim Barnett outlined Thursday a four-year, \$400 million increase in K-12 spending that would attempt to satisfy a Kansas Supreme Court order without raising taxes or expanding gambling.

Barnett, R-Emporia, called his plan ambitious, designed to satisfy the state's needs and stimulate the economy without breaking the state's bank account.

He planned to introduce the plan Thursday in the Senate Education Committee.

"We need someone with ambition and leadership. That's what's been lacking with our current governor," said Barnett, one of six Republicans seeking the party's nomination to challenge Democrat Gov. Kathleen Sebelius in November.

The plan calls for a \$125 million increase in fiscal year 2007, beginning July 1, which includes \$75 million in increases already required by state law.
