"Carol Sweat of Wallace worked with the Foundation to secure this gift," said Endowment Foundation Director Nick Wells.


"This is the first major gift under the leadership of President Skip Sharp working in partnership with the Foundation.

Agriculture and veterinary technology instructors and students will be assisting with the event.

Loos' daily radio commentary, Loos Tales, is a look at the people and places in rural America. Loos Tales is currently aired on nearly 100 stations throughout the Mid-

Anative of Quincy, Ill., Loos is a sixth generation farmer who got his start in the business at the age of 5 by raising swine. He expanded his operation, in conjunction with his father, to a purebred seedstock company supplying boars and gilts to producers across the country.

Loos earned an American Farmer Degree in Future Farmers of America and won numerous awards at state and national swine shows. He went on to work in many areas of the pork industry, from family seedstock supplier to managing a state-of-the-art multi-site unit.

In 2001, Loos began to share his knowledge and experience of production agriculture when he launched Loos Tales. Today, 3 million listeners on 100 radio stations,

His commentaries may be read in the "High Plains Journal" and his Loos Lips daily e-newsletter updates readers on the most current issues happening in regard to food production-typically centered on anti-ag activist groups, bio-terrorists and other attacks on the agriculture industry.

The public is invited to attend the open house and the talk by Loos. There is no admission charge.
