## Identify theft spurs new insurance

What Is Identity Theft?

Identity theft occurs when a person uses your personal information, such as Social Security number and date of birth, with the intent to commit fraud or to aid an unlawful activity. Once personal information is obtained, the person may open new credit card accounts in your name, open bank accounts in your name to write bad checks or take out a loan in your name. Federal law provides a \$50 liability limit for the fraudulent use of credit cards. Because of this, most identity theft victims never incur a high amount of direct monetary losses. However, restoring credit and correcting the information is a slow and timeconsuming process. Identity theft insurance is one way to help consumers cope.

#### What can you do to prevent **Identity Theft?**

Taking steps to protect your identity is important. Here are some suggestions:

#### Can You Insure Against **Identity Theft?**

If you are a victim of identity theft, it can be very costly to reestablish your credit and identity. Several companies are now offering identity theft insurance, which generally costs between \$25 and \$60 per year. Identity theft insurance cannot protect you from becoming a victim of identity theft and does not cover direct monetary losses incurred as result of identity theft. Instead, identity theft insurance provides coverage for the cost of reclaiming your fiof making phone calls, making pay (lost wages) and hiring an at-

### Things To Consider

• Find out what the policy lim-\$10,000 - \$15,000.

• Find out if there is a deductible. Some policies require you to pay the first \$100 - \$500 of costs incurred for reclaiming your financial identity.

- Remember, identity theft insurance does not cover direct monetary losses.
- If the policy covers lost wages, verify what limits apply and what is required to trigger this coverage. If you are a salaried employee or are required to request vacation time in the event of a work absence associated with reclaiming your financial identity, you may not have unpaid leave and lost wages.
- verify what limits apply and if legal work needs to be pre-approved by the insurer.

#### **Before You Buy**

Check to see if your current homeowner insurer includes identity theft insurance as part of your homeowner's insurance - some do. If not, you may be able to add identity theft insurance to your homeowner's policy for a small fee or purchase a stand-alone policy from another insurer, bank or credit card company.

# Mudslide buries Philippine village

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — A rain-soaked mountainside disintegrated into a torrent of mud in the eastern Philippines on Friday, swallowing hundreds of houses and an elementary school in sludge three stories high. At least 23 bodies were recovered, but 1,500 people remained missing.

The farming village of Guinsaugon on Leyte island, 420 miles southeast of Manila, was virtually wiped out, with only a few jumbles of corrugated steel sheeting left to show that the community of some 2,500 people ever ex-

"It sounded like the mountain exploded, and the whole thing crumbled," survivor Dario Libatan told Manila radio DZMM. "I could not see any house standing anymore."

Two other villages also were inundated, and about 3,000 evacuees were at a municipal hall.

"We did not find injured people," said Ricky Estela, a crewman on a helicopter that flew a politician to the scene. "Most of them are dead and beneath the mud."

The mud was so deep and unstable that rescue workers had difficulty approaching the school. Southern Leyte province Gov. Rosette Lerias told the British Broadcasting Corp. the school had 246 students and seven teachers. Only one child and one adult had been

Sen. Richard Gordon, head of the Philippine Red Cross, issued the casualty estimates and made an international appeal for aid.

There appeared to be little hope for finding many survivors, and only 53 were extricated from the brown morass before dark halted rescue efforts, officials said.

"It was like the whole village was wiped out," said air force spokesman Lt. Col. Restituto Padilla.

Aerial TV footage showed a wide swath of mud amid stretches of rice paddies at the foothills of the nowscarred mountain, where survivors blamed illegal logging for contributing to the disaster.

The measure clearing the Health and Human Services Committee is identical to a bill Gov. Kathleen Sebelius vetoed last year, requiring the Department of Health and Environment to impose minimum health and safety standards for abortion clinics.

The committee rewrote legislation championed by Rep. Nancy Kirk, D-Topeka, under which the health department would have drafted regulations for all surgical procedures occurring outside hospitals. Examples include liposuction colonoscopies.

Kirk's measure drew opposition from the Kansas Medical Society, and even Sebelius worried Wednesday about its potential cost. Also, the State Board of Healing Arts, which licenses doctors, approved its own regulations for office-based surgeries last week.

However, for many legislators, the more crucial issue was opposition from Kansans for Life, the

Kirk predicted Sebelius would veto the bill again. The governor, a strong abortion rights supporter, also vetoed similar legislation in

Some members viewed the listed complications from the aborcommittee's action as an attempt to create an issue to energize antiabortion activists as Sebelius seeks re-election this year. Others worried the bill would create regulations burdensome and expensive enough to shut down clinics.

"What this is all about is denying access to a procedure," said Rep. Sue Storm, D-Prairie Village.

Abortion opponents have repeatedly pointed to cases involving Drs. George Tiller in Wichita and Krishna Rajanna, who formerly ran a Kansas City, Kan., clinic as examples of why a law regulating clinics is necessary.
