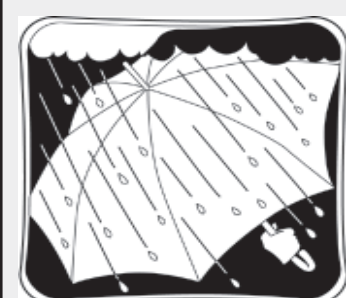

Law suit filed
over future bar

KANSAS CITY, Kan. (AP) — Wyandotte County officials who developers say initially granted a request to bring a bar to a shopping district near Kansas Speedway now face a legal battle, after denying a special-use application for the Coyote Ugly Saloon.
RED Speedway Inc., the developer of The Legends shopping center, claims it received approval in 2004 to bring in as a tenant the New York-based bar known for bartop-dancing women and the movie it inspired by the same name.
But wary that the national chain uses sex as a marketing tool, and after public outcry at two meetings earlier this year, Unified Government of Wyandotte County and Kansas City, Kan., commissioners rejected a permit required of businesses that intend to sell more alcohol than food.
That prompted lawyers for RED Speedway and Coyote Ugly to file a lawsuit contending officials acted arbitrarily. They also claim the original approval was instrumental in the design of The Legends and that \$2 million has been spent in constructing a building for the bar.

Corkins still playing defense over educational role

LAWRENCE (AP) — Six months after he was hired as the state's education commissioner, Bob Corkins says he's trying to do his best to convince critics that his intentions are good.
"I came into this position expecting a huge challenge, and it has been exactly that. It's been six months of pretty intense work," he said.
When he was hired as education commissioner, Corkins had no experience as a teacher or school administrator; he had operated think

tanks that criticized public schools and had lobbied against increases in state education spending.
The State Board of Education chose him on a 6-4 vote, with the conservative majority supporting the hire.
His hiring and the state board's fight over science standards critical of evolution have galvanized efforts to change the board's composition in the upcoming elections.
"There were several issues last fall that kind of energized folks,"

said Don Hineman, a Dighton rancher who is chairman of the Kansas Alliance for Education.
"The hiring of Corkins was one of those issues. He came in with a pre-existing bias against public education, and some of his activities since then have demonstrated that he still holds those opinions," Hineman said.
Education Board Chairman Steve Abrams, R-Arkansas City, defends Corkins.
"There's a learning curve with

any commissioner that would come on board," Abrams said. "The biggest challenge he has had is from the schools and convincing them that he isn't trying to destroy public education."
Soon after Corkins took the job, he was viewed as a threat when he pitched the ideas of more charter schools and a voucher program on a tour of western Kansas. And he advised legislators they need not follow the recommendations of a then-to-be completed study of education costs. The study has been cited by the Kansas Supreme Court as a necessary guide for lawmakers to meet their constitutional duty to fund public schools adequately.

Corkins also was criticized when he hired a consultant to help him with his transition.
"The wheels are coming off the wagon," said board member Bill Wagnon, D-Topeka, who voted against hiring Corkins.
"He is driving all professional staff out of the (Education) Department, and he embarked on a fool's errand to expand charter schools and exempt them from accountability," Wagnon said.
Corkins defends his performance and points to the board's support for all-day kindergarten and a new database to track student progress. He continues to make contacts across Kansas and is restructuring the Kansas Department of Education.
"It's a democratic process, just like the Legislature or any govern-

mental entity made up of elected officials. It will be rare when you have unanimous opinion on any given issue," he said.
John Morton, superintendent of the Newton school district, said Corkins has made an effort to meet people in the field.
But, Morton added, "The issues are so complex, it's tough to get up to speed on a lot of them. He certainly has a continuing task ahead of him in terms of that."
Corkins' future as commissioner hangs with the fall elections. It has been suggested his time is limited if moderates take control of the Board of Education and demand changes at the top.
But Corkins said he's not concerned about the elections.
"I'm here to do the best job I can in whatever time is available," he said.
