Three Colbyites selected for honorary degree

Three outstanding citizens who have contributed to the growth and success of Colby Community College for many years have been selected to receive honorary degrees during the annual commencement ceremony in May.

In recognition of their exceptional contributions to Colby College and civic leadership, Jay Donelan and Jim and Betty Firestone have been chosen to receive the college's most prestigious public award.

The college has presented the Honorary Associate Degree annually since 1986 as part of its National Community College Month observance.

Jay Donelan

Jay Donelan, lifetime resident of Colby, attended Colby public schools and graduated from Colby High School in 1941. At the age of 19, he joined the U.S. Air Force during World War II and served with the 8th Air Force in Europe. He was an Armor Gunner on a B-17 and flew 35 missions over Germany before his honorable dis-

Following his discharge, he attended watch repair school in Poplar Bluff, Mo. He owned and operated Donelan Jewelry in downtown Colby for 48 years.

His love and concern for Colby is apparent in his many varied community activities and leadership roles. He served on the St. Thomas Hospital Board, Urban Renewal Committee, Colby Housing Board and Colby High School Alumni Associa-

He is a charter member of the VFW, joined Lions Club in 1948, and is a 60-year member of the American Legion. He has been involved with the college since its inception and with his wife Marilyn has contributed to the college in many capaci-

"Jay has always been an avid sports fan," said CCC interim President Skip Sharp. "He has given 14 wrist watches over the vears to national wrestling champions plus a watch to Coach Steve Lampe for his selection as 'Coach of the Year.'


In addition to being a regular at the college sporting events, Jay also drove the college bus on many occasions.

"Alice Oelke and I took the first volleyball team to Garden City," said Donelan. "The coach was unable to attend. Alice and I acted as coaches and I had never played volleyball in my life.' He was also instrumental in helping with

the Colby Community College Endowment party auctions, assisting with annual commencement ceremonies, Thomas County Fair Booth and other activities.

"I was a reluctant participant in Jo Gatz's play production," said Donelan. "I was an undertaker and always wanted to smile when I was on stage, and she told me not to

Jim and Betty Firestone

James (Jim) Firestone is the first recipient to be awarded the honorary degree posthumously. A long-time resident who was well-known for his commitment to the growth and success of Colby and the college, Jim passed away in February.

Jim married Betty (Bailey) on March 22, 1956 after serving in the United States Navy from 1951-1954.

He served aboard the U.S.S. Burlington in Subic Bay in the Philippines, and later on the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Shangri-La,

"Jim and I would have been married 50 years on March 22, 2006," said Betty. "I met Jim after he left the Navy in Butler, Mo. I graduated from high school in Butler and then attended Central Missouri State Teachers College in Warrensburg, Mo. After Jim and I were married he went to work for Sinclair Refining Company in

Jim's job with Sinclair as a sales representative brought the Firestones to Colby in 1966. Jim later managed Colby Supermarket, worked at Larry's IGA, did sales and broadcasting work for KLBY and finished his working career at Golden Hard-

Betty worked at Montgomery Wards Building.

Catalog Store, J.C. Penney's and was employed at Palace Drug for 10 years.

Jim and Betty, along with their daughter Lisa, are also remembered for owning and operating the Coast to Coast Hardware store which was located at Fourth Street and Franklin for many years.

"Jim and Betty have been tireless in their commitment to the community and support of the college," said Sharp.
