Artist finds niche in ceramic fish

MANHATTAN (AP) — When Brandon Lutterman was 3 years old, he liked to draw pictures of whales and fish, which his mother kept as keepsakes.

Twenty-four years later, he still is fascinated with marine life, but instead of pencil and paper, his chosen media today is clay. Over the years, he has created about 250 ceramic sculptures.

"My mom's got a good portion of them," he said with a laugh. "She won't let anything go."

Lutterman, 27, who recently completed his course work for a master's degree in fine arts at Kansas State University, is the winner of the 2006 Niche Award for his ceramic sculpture "Unearthed." The Niche Awards are sponsored

by Niche magazine, an exclusive trade publication for American craft retailers. The awards honor outstanding creative achievements of American and Canadian craft artists in a variety of media. Works by this year's winners were featured in February at the Philadelphia Buyer's Market of American Craft, as well as in the spring issue of Niche magazine.

Lutterman, of Madelia, Minn., said "Unearthed" represents the landscapes and solitude of the Boundary Water canoeing area between the Minnesota-Canada border. It was created using curved slabs of clay that rest on legs that resemble tree branches. Rocks, branch sprigs and other natural objects were pressed into the clay to give it texture. Its glazes range from metallic to bright teal in color.

Even though he began drawing at an early age, Lutterman said he didn't make the decision to become an artist until he graduated from high school and received both basketball and arts scholarships to York College in Nebraska.

"I heard in church to invest in your talents," he said of his decision to follow his artistic dreams. "I'm busting my butt to make sure it pays

Lutterman went on to attend Mankato State University in Minnesota, where he worked on his bachelor's and master's degrees and narrowed his interest to ceram-
