# **Cheney boosts** morale at Fort Riley

FORT RILEY (AP) - VicePresident Dick Cheney used a visit Tuesday to this Army post for a morale-boosting rally for thousands of soldiers, even as questions about foreign policy continued to swirl about the administration.

Cheney took to a round stage on the Cavalry Parade Field on the south end of the post to praise the military for its service during the three-year-old war in Iraq and efforts to combat terrorism worldwide. His stage was circled by bleachers and an audience of almost 10.000

"Terrorists will fail when soldiers like you are standing in the way," the vice president said.

Just before Cheney arrived in Kansas, President Bush reiterated his support for Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld. Last week, six retired generals called for Rumsfeld to resign, saying he had ignored field commanders' advice, mishandled the war and operated with an arrogant management style.

Bush also discussed Iran's nuclear ambitions and hopes diplomatic efforts could prevent that nation from developing atomic weap-

Cheney didn't mention Iran or Rumsfeld. But he defended the war in Iraq, pointing to elections last year as evidence of success toward creating a stable, democratic nation. He said making Iraq stable would promote stability in the Middle East.

### Sebelius proposes free admission for residents

TOPEKA(AP) — Admission to the state's 24 parks would be free for Kansas residents starting Jan. 1 under a proposalGov.KathleenSebelius included Tuesday in budget recommendations to legislators.

Her proposal would set aside \$4 million in lottery revenues for the parks system and provide \$1.25 million in general tax revenues. The money would more than offset the loss of fees Kansans now pay, giving the Department of Wildlife and Parks new dollars to maintain parks and their roads, cabins, restrooms and bathhouses.

The department has complained for years that the state isn't providing enough tax dollars to maintain parks, forcing increases in entrance fees. This year, the cost of a per-day vehicle permit for most visitors rose to \$7 from \$6. while the price for an annual permit rose to \$46.65, up \$10 from last year. "We do hear that the fees are so high that they begin to impact on families, they begin to impact on low and moderate income Kansans and it keeps people away from the parks," said Wildlife and Parks Secretary Mike Hayden. Last month, senators approved a bill setting aside the lottery dollars for parks. The measure is before the House Appropriations Committee, and Sebelius endorsed it Tuesday. "We've spent years treating the parks like they had no value," said Senate Majority Leader Derek Schmidt, R-Independence. Legislators already have approved an \$11.7 billion budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1. But they plan to consider a bill wrapping up unresolved spending issues and correcting mistakes after they reconvene April 26.

"If the terrorists were to succeed. they would return Iraq to the rule of tyrants, make it a source of instability in the Middle East and use it as a staging base for ever greater attacks against America and other civilized nations," Cheney said. "The only way to lose this fight is to quit and quitting is not an option. That's not going to happen on our watch."

He also said the United States should stay its course because, "We are a nation that keeps its word, and so we will carry out a strategy for victory in Iraq."

Maj. Gen. Dennis Hardy, commanding general of Fort Riley and the 24th Infantry Division, said it was a great day for the post to get "a pat on the back," with the majority of its soldiers back from the war. About 500 remain deployed, including a battalion that left recently for duty in the Horn of Africa.

Hardy said progress is being made, though often the public doesn't see the results.

"We're going to see this war on terrorism through," Hardy said. "It's not over tonight. Certainly it's a hard-fought war."
