## Stem cell highlights speaker's series

Dr. Jason Scott Robert will be the final speaker of the 2005-06 Max Pickerill Lecture Series at Colby Community College.

Dr. Robert, a bioethicist, will address 7 p.m. May 2, the topic of stem cell research with particular emphasis on the ethics of this contentious science.

Robert is an Assistant Professor in the School of Life Sciences at Arizona State University.

He teaches in the Bioethics Program within the Center of Biology and Society. His doctorate is in philosophy from McMaster University in 2000.

Prior to joining the faculty at Arizona State University, he was a Canadian Institutes of Health Research New Investigator and Assistant Professor in the Department of Philosophy at Dalhousie University.

Robert has published many articles in the philosophy of biology and bioethics.

His first book "Embryology, Epigenesis, and Evolution: Taking Development Seriously," was published by Cambridge University Press in 2004.

Robert has been recently preoccupied with determining the roles

and responsibilities of scientists and bioethicists in the face of controversial science, such as the creation of part-human chimeras in stem cell biology.

He is a member of the Stem Cell Network in Canada, and he serves on the Advisory Board of the Canadian Institute of Population and Public Health.

The lecture will be held in the Northwest Kansas Cultural Arts Center on the Colby Community College campus.

## New books, old classics on Holocaust available at library

Tuesday, April 25, was designated as "Holocaust Remembrance Day."

It is a day to remember and reflect on this tragedy of World War II. Many of us have read "The Diary of Anne Frank" by Anne Frank and "The Hiding Place" by Corrie Ten Boom, or the graphic novel, "Maus" by Art Spiegelman.

Maybe you haven't read Holocaust

books, but chose to watch "Schindler's List" on the big screen. All are important stories and memorials to those who witnessed and survived. It's important to remember the Holocaust, as there are those today who assert that the Holocaust never happened.

This Holocaust denial is unfortunately a growing trend and it could continue to grow if we cease to remember and learn about the Holocaust. At the college library, we have a significant number of books and videos

related to the Holocaust. Two of the newest titles we've bought relating to the Holocaust are: "Nicholas Stargardt's Witnesses of war: Children's lives under the Nazi's" and "After Daybreak: the liberation of Bergen-Belsen" by Ben Shephard.

Witnesses of war is about more than the Holocaust. It is, in essence, about the experiences of children throughout Europe during World War II. However, it does emphasize the experiences of children who were survivors and victims of the Holocaust. "After Daybreak" concentrates on the aftermath of the liberation of the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp by the British in 1945.

It's a fascinating account of a time period that hasn't been written about before—what happened to the liberated in the last days of the war?

Unfortunately, the British were unable to effectively cope with the conditions they found. Short of appropriate food and means of providing sanitation, thousands of those

liberated died in the next month. "After Daybreak" reports the difficulties faced by the British and their struggle to provide for the sick and starving inmates until late 1946. Both are truly moving accounts.

If you are interested in reading titles related to the Holocaust, stop by and check one out. Remember, everyone is welcome at the Colby Community College library. Our hours are Monday through Thursday 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Sundays from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m.
