Dr. Jason Scott Robert will be the final speaker of the 2005-06 Max Pickerill Lecture Series at Colby Community College.

Dr. Robert, a bioethicist, will address 7 p.m. May 2, the topic of stem cell research with particular emphasis on the ethics of this contentious

Robert is an Assistant Professor in the School of Life Sciences at Arizona State University.

He teaches in the Bioethics Program within the Center of Biology and Society. His doctorate is in philosophy from McMaster University

Prior to joining the faculty at Arizona State University, he was a Canadian Institutes of Health Research New Investigator and Assistant Professor in the Department of Philosophy at Dalhousie Univer-

Robert has published many articles in the philosophy of biology and bioethics.

His first book "Embryology, Epigenesis, and Evolution: Taking Development Seriously," was published by Cambridge University Press in 2004.
