The example VanDyke gave was his famous work entitled "Monogram" that has a stuffed angora goat with a tire around it's middle standing on a platform that is one of Rauschenberg's paintings. Rauschenberg's work entitled "Satellite," has a stuffed pheasant standing on top of a collage of fabric patches and photos covered with several washes of paint.

According to "The Week" magazine article by Richard Lacayo from which VanDyke's report was made, "The combines were among his indisputable triumphs, and seeing them on their own makes you realize all over again their liberating power. They offer you a puzzle and VanDyke.




