Sheridan County Health Complex in Hoxie undergoes a major facelift next week.

Administrator Joe Stratton said the board of trustees approved at \$15,373 makeover for the pharmacy, records department, blood draw room, clinic hallway and creation of an education room.

"I've never seen a healthcare facility that sooner or later doesn't become office challenged," Stratton said.

Sheridan County Health Complex includes a 25-bed acute care critical access hospital built in 1952. In 1995 and in 1997, the facility underwent additions to include a long-term care unit and a rural health clinic.

Trustees Richard Krannawetter, Randy Farber, Charles Schwartz, Mary Karnes, Allen Neal, Craig Cooper and Shirley Slover in April approved Hoxie contractor Max Campbell to undertake the fivephase project.
