Dr. Antonio Vera

Dr. Antonio Vera, 74, of Kansas City, died Wednesday, June 7, 2006, at his home from complications from tuberculosis.

Dr. Vera was the father of Vanessa Eicher of Colby.

Dr. Vera was born April 15, 1932, in Madrid, Spain to Antonio Vera Montalban and Angela Martinez.

While growing up, the family lived in various parts of Spain, including the Canary Islands, Malaga and Barcelona.

In 1949, he contracted tuberculosis and spent five years in a hospital for tuberculosis patients in Vigo, in northwestern Spain.

During his illness, he was active in the Iglesia Evangelica Espanola. He attended seminary in Germany for three years, then returned to Spain, where he became active in the Youth for Christ movement in his church.

At the church in 1964, he met Catherine Crowe of Kansas City, Mo., who was studying abroad with

Vassar College. They later eloped and were married in Gibraltar.

They moved to the United States in 1966, where he was accepted at the University of Missouri and completed his Bachelor's, Master's and Doctoral degrees in history. He worked as a professor at William Jewell College in Liberty, Mo. from 1978-1997, teaching Spanish and Oxbridge history tutorials. He also created the college's Summer Program in Spain in 1978.

Dr. Vera is survived by his wife, Catherine; daughters Angela Holthouse and husband Travis of Rolla, Mo., and Vanessa Eicher and husband Eric of Colby; brothers Jose Maria (Pepe) Vera Martinez of Madrid, Spain and Angel Vera Martinez of Gap, France and three grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday at Second Baptist Church in Liberty, Mo. A reception will follow the funeral.
