Wheat weaving exhibit opens at Prairie Museum

The Prairie Museum of Art and History is hosting the traveling exhibit, "Golden Weaves of Grain" from the Kansas Association of Straw Artists, July 1-Aug. 15, said museum director Sue Taylor. The objective of the Kansas Association of Straw Artists is to preserve and promote the ancient art of the plaiting and decorative use of wheat straw.

On display will be wheat wall hangings, standing objects, and jewelry.

The exhibit includes over 50 pieces each intricate weaving a unique work of art.

Wheat weaving is an art practiced by the earliest civilizations. Objects made from dried straw are known to have been made in Europe, Asia, and South America, often related to harvest rituals where their creation was believed to insure good luck in the next growing season. In England it is called "corn dolly plaiting."

The term "wheat weaving" was coined in the United States where wheat is the straw of choice and it has become the recognized name of this folk art form. Wheat straw art is a folk art that was once passed down through the generations by family members.

Because of the mechanization of harvesting, the art almost died out.

Alex Coker from England revived corn dolly or wheat weaving in 1958. Doris Johnson from Luray learned the techniques and began teaching in Kansas in the early 1970s. It caught on like wildfire and spread throughout Kansas and the USA.

Donna Morgenstern, who is one of the artists whose work is featured in the exhibit, will be presenting a wheat weaving workshop at the Prairie Museum on Saturday, July 29, at 1 p.m.

Because the class size is limited, those interested need to register for the workshop by calling Chris Moore (785) 460-4590 before July 25. Pre-registration costs \$15 and registration after July 25 costs \$20.00. The fee includes the supplies and specialized instruction needed to create and finish your own unique wheat weaving. There will be something for everyone in this class, from beginning to more advanced weavers.

The exhibition is organized and toured by the Kansas Association of Straw Artists. Although the exhibit articles are not for sale, the Prairie Museum Mart has many pieces of wheat weaving available for purchase.
