
Weather Corner

Reminder about bicycles in city

The City of Colby is reminding bicyclists and others riding related devices about the ordinances against riding on sidewalks and other walkways. According to the law, no person riding a bicycle, roller skates, skateboards, coasters, toy vehicles or similar devices are allowed to use sidewalks or pedestrian walkways in the downtown business district. More specifically, the ordinance addresses designated sidewalks and walkways in the area from Second Street to Sixth Street between Chickamauga Avenue and Lake Avenue and other locations designated by the council.

Man given second chance on possession charge

In May, Kruse pleaded guilty to one count of sale of marijuana. Five other counts, three for possession with the intent to sell marijuana and two counts of sale of marijuana

Kruse sat next to his attorney, Todd Stramel of Colby, throughout the proceeding.

Stramel called Kruse as his only witness to testify about his successful participation in a drug and alcohol treatment program in Colby since his arrest in June 2005.

"The meetings are doing me good," Kruse said.


