Neighbors band together for woman

severely injured in a bicycle accident in late spring, Jeanne Gordon sowed seeds that are bearing a bumper crop in her garden and beyond.

Friends and family, similarly nurtured, are bringing in the harvest.

"What do you do with this much basil?"Gordon's daughter Genevieve asks while walking through the vegetable garden in the family's oversized College Hill yard. The herb's spicy fragrance hangs in the air, along with birds, bees and butterflies. Genevieve calculates that her mother spent eight hours a day out here, watering, transplanting stray seedlings, laying rock.

"I hope somebody is enjoying the strawberries," Genevieve says.

Somebody probably is. A dozen people are taking turns tending Jeanne Gordon's garden as she works to make progress from the accident June 3 that killed her oldest daughter, Gabriele, and injured her spinal cord. Gordon, who is 50 years old, was taken to Craig Hospital in Denver. It specializes in spinal cord and brain injuries.

"When something like this happens there's just this need to do something," says Clare Vanderpool, a friend and one of the garden volunteers.

Jeanne Gordon taught her to swim when she was a child, Vanderpool says. A couple of weeks before the accident, when Vanderpool's own child made her First Communion, Gordon showed up at their house with a gift of a pink rose floating in water in a clear glass, a silver ribbon encircling

"It was so thoughtful," Vanderpool says. "I didn't even know she knew Grace was making her First Communion."

Now Gordon's friends are the ones sending herflowers, and tales of what's going on in her garden back home.

One of those friends, Amy Baxt, walks a few blocks from her house to Gordon's several times a week. She visited Gordon two days after the accident and told her how lovely her birdfeeding areas were.

Gordon's reaction, Baxt says, was immediate.

"The birds!"

A tracheotomy prevented Gordon from talking at the time, but she mouthed words that Baxt understood loud and clear: "The seed for the birds is in a cooler under the back porch."

Baxt immediately took on the task of keeping Gordon's many feeders filled, and soon a meeting was convened of friends and relatives who promised to keep her garden going.

"This was her passion," says Genevieve, 24. "She understands what a massive amount of care it needs."

One friend connected a series of soaker hoses to timers so that the vegetable garden, edged in liriope, gets watered no matter what. The volunteers shower whiskey barrels of lavender, sage and thyme.

"They never have had a sprinkler system," says Mary Kay Rott, who lives across the street. "Jeanne is just out there dragging hoses."

Rott has her coffee every morning on her front porch, the ideal vantage point for viewing Gordon's garden.

'She loved to show it to people and share cuttings," Rott says. "When our oldest daughter got a house, she says, 'Oh, Kate, I want to give you some things to put in your yard.'

Gordon grew up in Wichita, but her grandparents were farmers, and she once called her aunts in Nebraska to walk her through the process of canning over the phone. Jars of jam fill shelves in the house.

"Shehasalwayshadakindofabond toward that kind of life," Genevieve says, "having space and being able to grow things.'

The Gordons' house sits on a double lot, and Jeanne used it to construct various gardens - while never obstructing the kids' football field, of course.

There's a memory garden where she has planted things from deceased relatives and departed neighbors; the vegetable garden, alternately producing lettuce and onions, turnips and tomatoes, strawberries and cucumbers; a secret garden at the back, where orange lilies run wild and pieces of mirrored glass hang on fishing line from the branches of the trees. In the morning the light reflects off the glass and dances on the flowers.

Gordon's new project this year was designing pots not only to hold plants but religious statuary as well: St. Fiacre, angels, a Pieta. There's a shrine to St. Joseph on the fence.

All the personal and spiritual touches fill the volunteers with a presence when they're in the garden.

"It's like being with Jeanne without being with Jeanne," one of them, Amy Herd, says.

Genevievesays that her family finds the volunteers "amazing." Their help creates a connection between home and hospital.

"It's so nice to be able to tell her, 'This is what's in bloom.' Or show her pictures," Genevieve says.

The connection isn't just one-way. The garden volunteers continue to feel the influence of their friend, who, they say, has not changed since the accident.

"She's pretty amazing in terms of her spirit,"Vanderpool says. "Not just coping with this but wondering what's Rott says, "It was just a huge part of her life," then catches herself and carries on in the next breath: "It will be again. She'll be back. It may not be in the exact same way we were used to. "But she'll be back."






