Over 20 years ago, in a book titled The Hurried Child," author David Elkind noted the importance of allowing "kids to be kids." His concern at that time was that children were increasingly involved in so many school and extracurricular activities they no longer had time just for themselves; to just play on the block with the neighbor kids or to set up a game of backyard dodge

Recently, Kimberly Chastain, MS, KMFT, voiced concern that children no longer seem to have time to goof off and just be children; "goof off" time is not on their schedule. Along with that, parents also don't seem to be able to find time to play with their child, or to sit down to a meal together.

Chastain suggests that this may be one reason why the number of children with anxiety and depression is increasing, and many children and adolescents describe themselves as "stressed out."

• Does your child have a genuine interest or passion for these activities, or is he/she participating because of your expectations?


• Have you become the family taxi driver, shuttling your child from activity to activity?
