This is not the first time a residence owned by Foust was used for a drug operation and raided.

In April 2002, Foust's son, Michael Keyes, along with Chris Barnett, Derrick Barnett and Joseph Henderson, were arrested for operating a meth lab at a residence in Brewster owned by Foust. In August 2002, Keyes and Henderson were found to have again manufactured meth at the same home. Both incidents occurred with Foust's alleged knowledge. In the October 2005 raid in

Oakley, Foust and Keyes, along with Betty Groblebe and Farrell Odum were arrested. Keyes was sentenced to just over seven years in prison, the case against Groblebe has been dismissed. Odum's case has been set for a preliminary hearing on Oct. 26.

Oakley man's plea changes drug charges

An Oakley man arrested during a Valentine's Day drug raid has entered a plea agreement and is scheduled to be sentenced in October.

Despite pleading not guilty in Logan County District Court in May, Roger Wright on Aug. 11 entered a plea agreement with the state and pleaded guilty to one drug charge.

According to court documents, Wright's guilty plea to one count of sale of methamphetamine looks to gain him the dismissal of five other drug charges.

Logan County Attorney Andrea Wyrick, along with Wright's attorney, Charles Stewart of Oakley, have asked District Judge Glenn Schiffner to depart from Kansas sentencing guidelines and order Wright to nearly six years in prison.

Schiffner ordered a presentence investigation of Wright's background, which includes a report on his criminal history. Not bound by the plea agreement, Schiffner retains the right to order Wright to a maximum prison term of six years rather than the lesser term outlined in the agreement.


