A former Oakley man was found guilty on eight counts of sex crimes which took place over a 15 month period of time.

After three hours of deliberation, a jury found Ryan Bloom, 29, guilty of one count of rape, six counts of aggravated indecent liberties with a child under the age of 14, and one count of lewd and lascivious behavior. The trial, which took place in Reno County District Court in Hutchinson, concluded Thursday after almost three weeks of testi-

Bloom, depending on his criminalia: Ana Lilibeth Arcega, 23, of nal history background, faces between 12 and 54 months in prison and a fine up to \$300,000 on the rape charge. He faces between four and one-half years and 20 years in prison and a fine up to \$300,000 for the aggravated indecent liberties with a child charges. He also faces between five and 17 months in prison and a fine up to \$100,000 for the lewd and lascivious behavior charge.

State law limits judges to imposing two times the maximum penalty of the most severe charge filed in a case, which in Bloom's case is the rape charge. The crimes took place between Jan. 1, 2005, and March 21, 2006, in Hutchinson.

Bloom served as Trego County Sheriff from June 2, 2003, to Jan. 3, 2005, and until arrested earlier this year, as an instructor at the Kansas

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in Hutchinson.

Reno County District Judge Richard Rome presided over Bloom's trial. A spokesman for Rome's office said Thursday Bloom is scheduled to be sentenced at 8:30 a.m. on

Bloom's wife, Jessica, and his mother-in-law, Barbara Johnson, are being detained in the Reno County Jail awaiting court dates for their involvement in Bloom's case.

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
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
