
Husband threatens to rape wife

Dear Dr. Brothers: I am in an awful position, and I don't understand what I am supposed to do. Does my husband really "own" me? This is what he keeps telling me, and I know it isn't true, but he insists that he can have sex with me whenever he wants to, and that it is my "wifely duty" to give in, even if I don't feel like it. Last night I really didn't want to, and he came close to forcing me before I relented and let him have his way. He has a strong sex drive, and I just am not interested. In other areas, he treats me pretty well. We have been married two years. Am I really being a bad wife to reject him, or is it OK?

Dear C.C.: It is not only "OK," but it is your right to reject him whenever you don't want sex. Your marriage vows implied that sex would be a part of marriage, but that doesn't mean you have to engage in any kind of sexual behavior against your will, just because it's with your husband. If he is using threats to get you to have sex, that is something that could get him into deep trouble.

While many states have laws against spousal rape, some are very weak and require a higher standard of proof because lawmakers feel there is a greater opportunity for abuse — for example, a woman claiming rape just because she is angry and wants to get even with her hus-

marriage. Wives traditionally had been considered a sort of property of the husband -'wifely duty" and all. But today, forcing sex upon a spouse is a serious crime, and your husband should be aware of this. In the meantime, you need to figure out why you are so averse to sex that your husband feels he must demand it. You should be able to come to some sort of compromise so that neither of you feels frustrated or abused. A marriage counselor might be able to help you discuss your issues.

Dear L.R.: It is a horrible feeling when you have to confront some of the ugly realities of kids growing up, especially when it involves exposure to ideas and images that are as disrespectful to women as most porn is. But don't panic; you can deal with this issue just as you have with the issues that have cropped up in all the years of your son's development. You don't say how long you have been widowed, but this is an area where you probably feel particularly helpless without your husband. But even though you might feelill-equipped or embarrassed, it's not a bad idea to have a conversation with your sons.

Most teenage boys will look at porn on the Internet - out of curiosity about sex, because it's fun and stimulating, and because their friends are doing the same thing. (If the 13-year-old hasn't done it yet, he probably soon will.) I think it is a little late to use blocking software; the kids need to be approached in a way that gives them specific information about what you expect from them.

There should be no money spent on pornography, and they should realize that these sites are not representative of how they should treat young women. Your sons will probably be mortified to be discussing this with you, so be satisfied with "a word to the
