University of Kansas chapel reopens after storm

LAWRENCE (AP) — Months after a storm damaged University of Kansas' Danforth Chapel, couples are again exchanging wedding vows there.

The chapel, a popular wedding location, was damaged during a severe storm on March 12. About 50 weddings that had been planned at the chapel over the summer had to move because of the damage.

But the chapel finally reopened three weeks ago, and Rosita McCoy, vice president of communications at the KU Endowment Association, credited private donations.

She said the chapel would not have been repaired if donors had not provided the money.

“Our alumni and friends came to the rescue here for Danforth, and for that we are so grateful,” said McCoy.

Chapel was to the roof, with repairs costing \$40,000.

The storm caused about \$6 million to the entire campus, prompting the KU Endowment Association to start a storm-recovery funding campaign.

Other roofs that were damaged on campus included those at Blake and Parker halls, Gertrude Sellards Pearson residence hall and the computer services facility.

Donations for Danforth Chapel included \$25,000 from Robert H. Malott, of Wilmette, Ill.; \$3,900 from the Historic Mount Oread Fund, an organization dedicated to preserving the university's heritage; and \$15,400 from several individuals.

McCoy said many contributors were married at the chapel.

Any extra money will be used on other projects at the chapel, and the KU Endowment Association continues to accept donations for Danforth.

The 60-year-old chapel usually has about 500 weddings and 250 other events each year. About 5,000 couples have been married there since it opened in 1946.

Sheriff speaks on consolidation

Sheridan County Sheriff Jim Johnson believes taxpayers need a voice in who leads their law enforcement officers.

Johnson told Sheridan County Commissioners David Zimmerman, Ron Schamberger and Keith Kennedy he did not support consolidation as an option of providing Hoxie a law enforcement system.

"I feel people need a voice in saying to their top law enforcement officer is," Johnson said.

Since talk about Hoxie not having its own police department started back in 2003, Johnson has opposed consolidation of the city police and county sheriff's office.

Such a move by state law would

do away with the elected office of sheriff and be replaced by a commission or agency appointed director of law enforcement.

Johnson said Hoxie's mayor, Lori Horesky, and two commissioners, Jim Erwin and Troy Dewey, learned Police Chief John Bieker is retiring as of Dec. 31.

Johnson said he's looking at how much it would cost to enter an annual contract with the city to provide law enforcement.

He said while he supports a contract arrangement with Hoxie, he does not want it to be at the cost of current county law enforcement.

Johnson also said the type of contract he'd be in favor of would keep in place the current system of Hoxie having its own city attorney and city court.

The commissioners supported

Johnson working with Hoxie's city officials to draft a contract which would ultimately result in the sheriff's office providing county-wide law enforcement effective in January.

Hoxie is one of three third-class cities located entirely, or in part, in Sheridan County.

The other two are Selden and the eastern one-half of Menlo, the other half of which is located in Thomas County.

Johnson's office already provides protection for Selden and the eastern one-half of Menlo, as well as the unincorporated cities of Sequin and Angeles, both located in the western one-half of Sheridan County, and Tasco and Studley which are located in the eastern one-half of the county.
