# Alaska tour planned

Colby Community College is offering a spring study expedition tour to Alaska May 20, 2007.

The tour starts in Fairbanks, located in the interior of Alaska, not far from the Arctic Circle. Participants will travel south through the pristine wilderness to Denali National Park and then to Anchorage, Alaska's largest city.

Two options are available for those who sign up for the trip. The one-week option is scheduled from May 20-27. Participants will visit the Fairbanks UAF Museum, Animal Research Station, cruise the Chena and Tanana Rivers on the Riverboat Discovery III and may opt to take a flight above the Arctic

On May 22, the group will board a motorcoach for a tour to Denali National Park and participate in a Tundra Wilderness Tour. The following day students will participate in a service program at Denali National Park.

Railroad is May 24 with Anchorage as the destination. The next day is the Anchorage City Tour and a visit to the Alaska Native Heritage Cen-

A scenic journey on the Alaska

On May 26, participants will board a motorcoach for a journey south on the scenic Seward Highway and a glacier cruise.

Upon completion of the glacier cruise, passengers who are staying for another week board the Princess Cruise Lines ship for a seven-night voyage.

The cruise includes College Fjord, Glacier Bay National Park, Skagway, Juneau, and Ketchikan with a destination of Vancouver, British Columbia, June 2.

Cost for the one-week option is \$2,475 based on double occupancy. and out of Anchorage.

Cost for the two-week option is \$3,450 based on double occu-

These prices do not include tuition and fees for those who enroll to receive college credit.

Credit is available for those who enroll in Cultural Anthropology (3 credit hours), Historical Geology (3 credit hours), or Observational Astronomy (1 credit hour).

One of the ways the Colby Community College sophomore is preparing for that career is working as a peer tutor in the Comprehensive Learning Center.


Sandoval, a native of Lamar, Colo., works 10 hours each week in the center helping students with algebra, chemistry, anatomy and physiology and English composition courses.
