Romine said Hansen's work throughout the Colby community show she supports it and supports public affairs.





Total foreign graduate student enrollment at U.S. universities increased for the first time since 2001, according to the Council of Graduate Schools.

The increase includes a 12 per- per.' cent increase in students enrolling for the first time.

At the University of Kansas, total international student enrollment dropped from 1,677 in 2001 to 1,500 in 2005.

This year, total international student enrollment increased about 5 percent to 1,579 students this fall, the first such increase for the university since 2001.

And first-time enrollment increased from 166 last year to 178 this fall, a 7 percent increase.

Expert says keep gift-giving in perspective
