Replacement search begins for education commissioner

TOPEKA(AP) — The search for an anti-Corkins has begun.

Education Commissioner Bob Corkins resigned last month after 13 tumultuous months on the job, cleaning out his office the day before Thanksgiving.

His departure saved the State Board of Education the effort of firing him once two new, less conservative members take office Jan. 8.

There was little doubt Corkins would be fired after power slipped away from the 6-4 conservative

Republican majority that hired him, unless he resigned first. The four board members who opposed his appointment continued to criticize his work, and many edu-

cators, including classroom teachers, thought him a poor choice. Corkins didn't have any experience running a school district or even a school before he was hired, and he previously had lobbied

for education. He supported vouchers and sought to increase the number of charter schools, which operate under reduced regulations.

The next commissioner will have already had an extensive career in public education before being hired sometime next year.

That person also is unlikely to push the board to consider limited voucher programs or aggressively advocate charter schools.

The new choice isn't likely to be anywhere near the jaw-dropper Corkins' appointment was.


