However, something else may be partially responsible. Studies have revealed that during those early, passionate months or years, when a couple is deeply in love, the testosterone level tends to rise slightly in the female — which might account for an increase in sexual appetite, turning her into a more aggressive sexual partner — but testosterone decreases in the male, making him less aggressive and more sensitive, and causing him to be more attractive — actually more like his female partner, in many
