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
Live from Colby

Kayak classes offered

An introduction to whitewater kayaking will be offered by Colby Community College 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. Saturday, March 24.

"Although Colby may not seem like a logical place to try whitewater kayaking, the large campus pool provides a good location to learn the basics of the sport," said economic development director Barry Kaaz. "Students will also have the opportunity to participate in a follow-up Colorado River two-day course later this spring."

Those who enroll will learn basic paddle strokes to maneuver the kayak, hip snaps, methods to safely exit the kayak while upside down, and the Eskimo roll.

The course will be taught by professionals from Renaissance Adventure Guides, LLC located in Lakewood, Colo. The \$100 fee will include equipment rental.


