For a clean room, be specific

MANHATTAN — Children's definition of "clean" is likely to be different from their parents' definition, said Charlotte Shoup Olsen, Kansas State University Research and Extension family systems specialist.

"So, the next time you ask a child to clean his room, be specific," Olsen advised.

"Decide what's bothering you the most — an unmade bed or dirty

clothes on the floor, for example. Then, ask the child to tackle that job first."

A child who knows exactly what a parent expects is also better able to complete the job, she said.
