"I hope the voters come in support of it. The new center is a vital part of keeping Colby college competitive. It will complement the education field and make all of Thomas County competitive as a place for people to live and work.'

Leiker, 52, said expanding the college's academic programs is one way to bring more attention and enrollment to the school. During a recent trip to Denver, he realized the importance of a Colby college program. Leiker said he met a health care provider employee. That person was waiting to get into one of metro-Denver's nursing schools.

"In Denver, there's a waiting list, first-come, first-serve," Leiker said about the person's situation. "Good students want to get in. It would be great to say we can get you in."

Colby Community College's nursing program is just one of several programs Leiker said the college needs to advertise.

We have a lot of good things going. We need to get that out," he said.

To complement the programs, Leiker said he is interested in utilizing more technology in the academics. "We need to keep up," he said. He said Fort Hays State University has podcast some class material. That is when students receive class instructions via their computer rather than the teacher.Getting the students to come to Colby Community College is one thing, making sure they enjoy their time here is another.

Leiker said he is in favor of creating some programs based on student interest. Considering Colby's proximity to the Rocky Mountains, Leiker said the college could start a

ski club for students and have occasional trips to ski resorts. The town needs to cater more

toward the students," he said. The college's proposal to build a \$15 million gymnasium and wellness center is another idea to improve the students' time at college, Leiker said. College athletic programs will benefit from the center and college officials have said if approved, the proposal should at-

tract more students to Colby. "I'm in favor of it," he said. 'We're doing something to help ourselves. We're not waiting for the next miracle. It's not going to happen and we're not going to get anywhere."

Leiker has lived in Colby since 1967. He is a route driver for UPS.



Part of the college's proposal is to build a new 260-bed dormitory estimated at \$5 million. Leiker appreciates the current board's plans.

"I am for anything that is going to move this town forward," he said. We need the customers and the college is a business."


