23, in Gross Memorial Coliseum. Administrators at the event will be available with talk to students throughout the morning.



# Sign attracting visitors to museum

Thomas said the museum was chosen for the sign because of its proximity to Interstate 70 and Taylor was willing to give the ground.

Thomas said the convention and visitors bureau wanted to help the museum in any way it could.

"The museum is a wonderful attraction and we want to keep what we've got," she said. "It is a fabulous place with wonderful treasures for people to view."

Taylor is glad for the support. "Things are getting better," she

said. Proof of that is the museum gal-

lery, which is sporting a new look. "The ABC gallery is still here,"

Taylor said. "We're going to put in some new things. The Colby panorama that used to be in the education room now hangs

in the main gallery. "We wanted a permanent place we could hang it," she said. "It's

heavy and hard to move." The gallery has been reconfigured to make better use of

existing space. The area is also getting new carpet. Opening up the space will allow for more temporary exhibits and more possibilities for classes. It gives the museum 1,600 square feet more open space. Taylor said visitors are shocked

when they see it.

"They had no idea we had this kind of space left," she said.

Volunteer labor has helped with the gallery's reconfiguration. Volunteers helped move cases Also, the museum could always use volunteers. However, Taylor said volunteers are needed for specific tasks, such as construction.

Another goal will be met in the

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near future. Leadership Thomas County is helping with a hands-on area for children. Leadership Thomas County is a class held each year to develop leaders for the county.

"It's going to look like a house," Taylor said. "We're going to call it the Kansas Kids Corner."

Artifacts and other items will be on display for children to enjoy.

"This was one of the things that came out of the planning meetings last spring," she said.

Hopes for the future are to in-

clude an exhibit on the history of the High Plains, but it is still just an "Exhibits are very costly," she

said, ranging from \$25,000 to \$50,000 to put together. More activities are planned this

High Plains Art Club has expressed an interest in increasing arts

programming at the museum.

In conjunction with its June Arts Jubilee display in downtown Colby this summer, it is sponsoring a children's watercolor class at the museum. Art from Colby High School students will also be on exhibit in June.

In July, the museum is holding a batik class. Batik is a fabric dying technique by putting wax on the portions to be left undyed.

This fall, Taylor said the museum will have a display focusing on sunflowers.

Developing a museum endowment is also a goal. It would help with expenses such as painting, replacing windows and other needs.

The museum, which features items from the Kuska Collection. has more than 40,000 artifacts in its collection.

The Kuska Collection was amassed by former Colby resident Nellie Kuska. Her family donated the collection to the museum.

In addition, there are more than 60,000-70,000 documents, photos and manuscripts. In the collection, there is furniture, the original soundboard from KXXX radio station and more.

Taylor said plans for this fall involve some of that furniture, which will be featured in a new exhibit.

'Many people do not understand much goes on behind the scenes with the collection itself. Maintaining it takes a lot of work, and documentation and proper storage take time," Taylor said.

People constantly donate items to the museum.

People will get a better look during the Thomas County Historical Society annual meeting at 1:30 p.m. Sunday.

There will be a business meeting followed by a first person interpretation of Charles J. "Buffalo" Jones by Dr. Phillip Thomas of Wichita State University. At one time "Buffalo Jones" was a buffalo hunter, but he later became famous for the preservation of American bison.




