Sheridan County hospital losing patients to other facilities

Sheridan County taxpayers may have to decide how important a hospital is to them.

Sheridan County Health Complex Administrator Joe Stratton told county commissioners Keith Kennedy, Doyle Kauk and Ron Schamberger it is time to get serious about spending more tax dollars for the facility.

"According to the Kansas Hospital Association," Stratton said, "50 percent of the residents in Sheridan elsewhere for healthcare.

Stratton, administrator for the past 20 months, said residents seeking healthcare outside of the county is only part of the problem which caused a \$446,524 loss in 2006. He said the number of days patients are in the hospital, not enough equip-

He said it was not until France arrived in 2006, that inpatient numbers started to climb. Stratton also said since France's arrival in the community, patient visits have increased at Hoxie Medical Clinic.

"There were 204 new patients at Hoxie Medical Clinic in 2006," Stratton said. "That's patients who have never been in the facility or have not had care in five years.'

Despite some things "going well" at the complex, Stratton said not having a CT-scan and sonogram machines is forcing some patients to use other hospitals for medical tests, and if needed, hospitalization. He said it would cost between \$250,000 and \$600,000 to purchase a CT-scanner, the lesser amount for

State law does not allow a hospital to exceed six mills without asking taxpayers for additional funding. In Sheridan County, one mill currently equals about \$35,000, based on a 2006 valuation of \$35,315,783 dollars.
