Tourism impact is boon for Kansas

Memorial Day is history and we are now well on our way into the summer season, but first some facts and figures about tourism which we shared with our volunteers during Tourism Week. In 2004, the total impact of travel and tourism (direct and indirect) in the state of Kansas was \$5.6 Billion. 166,951 jobs were created for Kansans by tourism economic activity or 12.6 percent of total employment in the state. Tourism generated \$1.8 billion in federal, state and local government taxes in 2004.

Locally \$184,153 in guest tax at 3% was collected in 2005. This means that the lodging facilities sales were over \$6.1 million dollars. According to the International Association of Convention and Visitor Bureaus, the average traveler spends 40 percent of their travel dollar on lodging while 60 percent is spent on non-lodging including food, attractions, shopping and gas. That 60 percent would be \$9.2 million for Colby. Income from the overnight traveler alone would be \$15.4 million. These are all out of county dollars brought into our community which is economic development at its best. We are thankful for the travelers and certainly welcome them to our community.



Purse safety


Dear Heloise: I have noticed that my column. women put purses in the child seat on shopping carts - an easy target
