WASHINGTON (AP) - Kansas race. Sen. Sam Brownback raised nearly \$1.5 million for his presidential bid over the last three months, his office said Monday, barely ahead of the \$1.3 million he raised the previous quarter and trailing far behind his other GOP rivals.

Spokesman Brian Hart said the campaign had not yet calculated how much cash on hand Brownback had to spend on the other candidates.

Brownback has lagged well behind better-known Republican candidates in campaign contributions, and the latest numbers will put him even further back in the money race. By contrast, Arizona Sen. John McCain raised \$11.2 million in the second financial quarter of the year, which ended Saturday. McCain's
