Eldon Benjamin Van Campen November 18, 1913 - September 13, 2005

Eldon Benjamin Van Campen, 91, of Colby, Kansas, died on September 13, 2005, in Colby, KS at Citizens Medical Center. He was born November 18, 1913, on a farm near Clifton, Kansas, the son of Walter Ellsworth and Winona Alice (Blue) Van Campen.

The family moved to Colby in 1918 where Eldon attended public schools. He graduated from Colby High School in 1933. Eldon had an avid interest in cars and all things mechanical, receiving an early vocational education working at the Sinclair gas station in Colby. Most of his active working years were spent as an auto mechanic and car salesman. Following retirement due to failing evesight, he continued to remain active with his woodworking hobby and provided many handcrafted items for local children and charities.

On February 8, 1941, in Junction City, KS, he married Tryphena Pearl Davis of Madison, KS. Phena died June 7, 1966, in Colby, KS after several years of illness. Eldon later married Mary (Roberts) Pratt on December 27, 1969, in Colby, KS. Mary died August 7, 2002, in Colby, KS.

During W.W.11, he served with the 1905th Aviation Engineer Battalion for 3 years in the China, Burma & India Theater, as a heavy equipment operator, aiding in the construction of the Burma Road. He was past Commander of VFW Post 6882 of Colby. Eldon was a lifetime member of the American Legion, VFW, and the Colby United Methodist Church.

He was preceded in death by his parents, wives, and three sisters: his twin, Maxie M. Schleff, Mamie F. Van Campen, and Esther M. Brown.
