## Eagles riding huge wave of momentum into regional meet

Cross country coaches around the state who didn't think the Colby Eagles would be a factor this postseason, after a tough start to the year, may be in for a rude awakening Saturday at the 4A Cross Country Regional Meet in Marysville.

The Eagles may have started the year slow, but come into regional action having won their seventh Northwest Kansas League Championship in eight years on the boys side and their 12th in 13 years on the girls side.

It's not just the Eagles winning the league title that should have opposing coaches worried, it's how dominate they were in doing so. The girls placed six of their seven runners in the top 10, including four of the top five, while the boys had four of their seven runners in the top 10 and Senior Josh Baden broke the Oberlin course record for the second time this year.

There's no better time to be running your best, and the Eagles appear to be doing just that.

"We're right where we want to be," said Eagle head coach Bob Mannebach. "Our times at league are probably going to scare any coach who saw them. We're running the best we have all year, and hopefully that's good enough. If we went two or three weeks longer, I don't know if we could get any better."

The Eagles will look to continue to build on their recent success Saturday against 15 other teams, 13 of which hail from the eastern side of the state. The top three teams in both the girls and boys meet and the next 10 best individuals will advance to the state meet Oct. 27 in Wamego.

Although the competition will undoubtedly be tougher, Mannebach expects both of his teams to be heading back east next weekend.

"If we run like we're capable of, both teams have should make it to state," said Mannebach. "It's not going to be easy. Clay Center and Wamego (who will both be in Marysville) are two very tough teams. If we run like we did in Oberlin, we should be in good shape, and if we don't, it will be tough.'

Another big reason for Mannebach's confidence is that, for the most part, the Eagles are finally healthy after an injury-plagued season that affected both the boys and girls teams.

Ryan Baalman, Katherine Kaus and Aubrette Stephens were all held out of at least one meet at the beginning of the year because of various ailments. Consequently, the boys finished fourth at the team's opening meet in Goodland and ninth at their second meet at Wamego.

Wamego and finished 11th.

The return of all three runners led to a surge in the team's performance at the end of the year, that included not only a league championship, but first place finishes for the girls in Hays and Oberlin and a combined team championship at their final regular season meet in Lakin.

'The girls still aren't completely healthy, but for a while it seemed like a different girl was getting hurt every week," said Mannebach. "Just like in any sport, you have to have everyone healthy. An injury can really mess you up. We're as close to 100 percent as we've been all year."

One runner who has steered clear of the injury bug and has maintained a torrid pace all year long is senior Josh Baden.

Baden, who qualified for state last year, finished third in his first two regular season meets, but has won of five of his last six meets, including two record-breaking performances in Oberlin. The only meet Baden didn't win was Lakin, but he still managed to finish second.

After starting the year with a time of 18:01 in Goodland, Baden cut that by nearly two minutes, finishing in 16:05 at league.

"I'm running pretty good right now," said Baden. "It's better than I was doing earlier in the year. I've been running my whole life, so I want to do well this weekend."

Baden has been the top boys runner in every meet this year, but he will need help if the Eagle boys are to advance to state.

Baalman, Adam Schroeder and Matt Kaus all finished in the top 10 at league and all ran their best times of the year. Mannebach says he will need a similar performance from them, and his other three runners, if the boys want to be successful.

"It's gotta be a team effort," said Mannebach. "They've shown improvement. I just need them to be a little more consistent. After the Lakin meet, I was concerned. I didn't feel they ran well.
