That combination allowed Sebelius to recommend new spending on early childhood and higher education programs, pay raises for state workers and bigger pensions for government retirees. She and her budget staff believe the state will receive its first gambling revenues, from slot machines at race tracks, later this year. But Budget Director Duane Goossen acknowledged the administration assumes the law allowing the new gambling will withstand a pending court challenge.

Sebelius proposes to increase total spending about 3.6 percent, to nearly \$13.6 billion for the 2009 fiscal year, which begins July 1.
