

Eagle basketball teams poised for success at Orange and Black

In the 23 year history of the Paul Wintz Orange and Black Classic, the Colby Eagle boys and girls basketball teams both reached the tournament finals.

The Colby Lady Eagles have won six of the last seven tournaments, but the boys have only gone as far as the third place game in that time.

Lady Trojans squelched by #16 Cloud

The Colby Community College Lady Trojan basketball team (8-11, 3-2) lost 76-53 Wednesday to Cloud County at the Colby Community Building.

The Lady Trojans shot just 34 percent from the field and struggled against Cloud County's halfcourt pressure defense.

Cloud also struggled from the field, connecting on just 34.3 percent of their shots in the first half, but rebounded with a 51.4 percent shooting effort in the second half.

"Our backside defenders didn't rotate well," said Lady Trojan head coach Tom Stephens of the team's

second-half defense. "They got a making 7-9 attempts. Lauren Forbunch of easy shots."

Stephens also mentioned the 11 offensive rebounds Cloud got as a reason field goal percentage dis-
