Big defensive play preserves Eagle win

ver is known mostly for his offensive prowess, but Monday the Eagle sharpshooter showed he can also make a game-winning play on the defensive end.

With the Eagles ahead of Thomas More Prep-Marian (Hays) 73-70 with less than a minute left, the Monarchs Nolan McNeil rebounded Keith Gustin's missed free throw and was in position for a potential putback that would have cut the deficit to one.

Instead, Stover stepped in front of McNeil and drew a charge with 51.2 seconds left.

Colby held TMP scoreless the rest of the way and hit three free action and we were the more agthrows to pull out a 76-70 win over the 4A defending state champion Monarchs at the Colby Community Building.

"It was a very physical game. There was so many close plays. but that was a big one," said Eagle head coach Beau Sheets.

The call drew a boisterous negative reaction from the Monarch contingent and head coach Joe Hertel, who had reached his boiling point after seeing his team whistled for 27 fouls in the game.

"I was unhappy with the call, because they call tick-tack stuff on us on one end and then call that on us," said TMP head coach Joe Hertel whose team fell to 7-8.

Sheets certainly wasn't com-12-4 and beat TMP for the first time since the 2003-2004 season.

"It's a big win for us. Even though they're a younger team, they're the returning state champs and there's a reason why," said Sheets. "They're very solid, aggressive and physical. I tip my hat to them."

It's no telling where the Eagles would have been without Stover, just over 3 minutes into the game.

"Twenty-five points and only Colby senior guard Ethan Sto- one turnover, and he guarded their best player the whole game, he did a great job for us," said Sheets. Stover had 18 of his points in

the first half which saw Colby shoot 67 percent. The trio of Stover, Levi Schlick

and Stephen Dinkel combined for 55 points. Schlick was 7-8 for 14 points while Dinkel scored 14 of his 16 points in the second half.

Colby shot a sizzling 27-42 (64 percent) for the game, but still had a hard time putting away the pesky Monarchs who had 12 second half offensive rebounds and forced the Eagles into 21 turnovers.

"I felt like we initiated all of the gressive club," said Hertel.

The Monarchs trailed by seven with 4:45 remaining in the fourth quarter, but could never get closer than three points the rest of the way as the Eagles answered every time TMP made it a one possession game.

"It was good to battle back after every shot they made," said Schlick.

"I don't know if its toughness or we're lucky. It shows some resiliency," said Sheets.

The Eagles were also helped down the stretch as TMP's point guard and leading scorer Drew Hertel fouled out with 3:26 left after scoring 13 points.

"That was huge," said Sheets. plaining as his team improved to "He was real smart and was able to initiate their offense. I was surprised he only had 13 points. It seemed like he had three times that."

TMP shot just 41.2 percent in the second half after shooting 55 percent in the first. They also finished 2-9 (22 percent) from the three point line.

In the final minute of the game, the Monarchs were 0-3 from the field and had a turnover.

"I'm frustrated for my kids, because they layed it all on the line," said coach Hertel. "I don't have one varsity kid that logged a second of varsity last year. We had more energy and had them on their heels, but you still have to find away to put the final stamp on things."

It was the Eagles that put the final stamp on Monday's game and made for an unhappy ride home in the snow for TMP.


nior varsity team kept on rolling Monday as they defeated Thomas More Prep-Marian (Hays) 65-40 to improve to 14-0.
