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Golf course on par . . . so far

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After a tumultuous winter, Colby's Meadow Lake Golf Course is ready for people to start playing golf. The clubhouse opened Tuesday. But for how long the course will be under current ownership is uncertain.

"We fell on hard times," said John Sears, president of the shareholder group overseeing the course's business. "The restaurant was not holding up its end of the deal. The golf course was fine. We held steady on membership, so no complaints there." he said. In early 2007, the course took

on more of a public business feel, rather than a traditional, private, country club plan. But there were still evident problems a year later. The restaurant closed in January.

"We put figures together. For whatever reason, were we too far out of the mainstream? People don't want to sit down with tablecloths, napkins and linen? Whatever it was, the overhead ate us up," Sears said.

In December, Sears said he and the 17 other shareholders met and decided on a new course of ac-

"Our outcome was to sell our share of what we own," he said.

Sears said the restaurant was the biggest financial hurdle. Last year, there were about 120 members to the course. This year, there are currently about 72.

"With all the confusion and indecision, we are well over half of original memberships. We have a great base," he said. "We never thought of a bankruptcy."

The shareholder group owns about 13.5 of the approximate 67 acres the course sits on. Included in the shareholder group is the cart shed, clubhouse and very small portion of the actual course. The

The shareholder group has a longterm lease for the land from the city.

"We listed the property for sale,"

all of us, especially those close to the course.'

Sears said having a golf course in Colby is vital.

"It's important for the city. When Sears said. "In the meantime, we people come to Colby, they need

schools, medical facilities, good roads, good trash pick up and they also need good recreation. Colby doesn't offer much, if it's not the golf course."

Sears said the course is appreciated by more than just those with an interest in golf as a hobby. The course will be used by Colby High's and Colby college's golf teams. Various groups and organizations have benefit golf tournaments. Sears said those events have been scheduled.

"We are still scheduling. Most of them who have used it in the past have contacted us.

"The high school will still play. We are meeting those demands,' Sears said.

Colby Rotary is planning its third annual golf fundraiser this year. Rotary President Mike Fell said the golf course is important to the town and the people.

"It's tremendous. With a golf course, there is platform to raise money for community projects and activities. The golf course is a great environment to establish and build new friendships," Fell said.

Fell said the past two Rotary golf events have been very successful.

"The golf course represents a lot of the same theme as Rotary with fellowship and to come together for a good reason," he said.

Even though the golf course won't have its own restaurant to feed people while playing golf or raising money for a group, Sears said catered food will be an option.

"The only change is no full-service restaurant. We will get food if needed," he said.

Should the shareholders accity of Colby owns the remaining wanted at least a golf course for cept an offer from a potential, what happens next is unknown.
