New agent likes variety

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Diversity is the most enjoyable aspect of the job for Thom-County's newest agent at the K-State

Research and Extension office. "There's a lot of things

happening all Milliman year," said 27year-old Clint

Milliman. "There's always something going on, and there's diversity and I like that."

Milliman grew up in Newton, Ill. and began his career with K-State Research and Extension in 2004 at the Post Rock Extension District in Osborne County. He earned his bachelor's and masters' degrees in agribusiness economics at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale. While at the university, Milliman competed on the rodeo team for three years, during which time he received the "Cowboy of the Year" and "Hard Luck" awards.

An avid equestrian, Milliman, along with his wife, Jessica (Beebe) Milliman, enjoy riding horses and judging horse shows. His wife serves as the Extension agent for Sheridan County and the couple lives in Hoxie.

Milliman said he applied for the job of Extension agent having only been in Kansas "one or two Illinois.

"I was involved in 4-H and oked for Extension jobs in Illinois and applied for some in Kansas," he said. "I worked in Osborne County for three years and then we decided to get married."

Married on Saturday, Oct. 6, 2007, in Cooper Barn on the grounds of the Prairie Museum of Art and History in Colby, Milliman started his new job the following Monday on Oct. 8.

"I'm one of two agents in this office," Milliman said. "Diann

Gerstner is the Family Consumer Science Agent and I'm the Agriculture Agent."

Milliman said he and Gerstner and gearing up for what is a busy time of year preparing for the Thomas County Fair.

"We are getting out in the county meeting with agriculture people and getting ready for the 4-H fair," Milliman said.

He said the Thomas County Fair is "actually two fairs in one." He said the fair is made up of the Thomas County Free Fair and the Thomas County 4-H Fair.

"The Free Fair is for open class exhibits and is along the same lines of the 4-H Fair, but is judged separately and has evening entertainment," Milliman said. "People in the open class compete against peers, older and younger, and they don't compete against a 4-Her unless the 4-Her has an exhibit in the open class. It's basically open to the world.'

Milliman said he and Gerstner are currently overseeing about 160 youth in 4-H.

"We have 34 different divisions, including livestock, agriculture, crops, horticulture, foods, nutrition, clothing and arts and crafts," he said.

On the job for six months now, Milliman said the best part about his job is learning about the variety of crops in northwestern Kansas. Unlike Illinois which grows predominately corn and soybeans, Milliman said it has taken him some time to get used to the multiple harvest seasons here.

"There's some wheat in Illinois, times" prior to moving here from but it's on a different scale," he

He said he has had to learn to work around the fact the area has multiple crops and a drier climate than where he grew up.

'Scheduling meetings around harvest or planting season has been challenging," Milliman said.

"There's always something going on, so it's hard to schedule around those times. And getting adjusted to the climate has been challenging."

Archeology school offered

Participants in the 2008 Kansas Archeology Training Program field school will have a rare opportunity to excavate at a nationally significant site from May 31 through June 15, said Virginia Wulfkuhle, public

archeologist with the Kansas State Historical Society. "The Pawnee Indian Museum State Historic Site (14RP1) sits on the bluff overlooking the Republican River in Republic County, and the field school will recover new and valuable information about this fortified village that was occupied by the Kitkahahki band of the Pawnee tribe in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries," she said. Details of the project will be included in the registration packet, which is available in hard copy and posted on the state historical website: kshs.org/resource/katpcurrent.htm. Registration forms submitted by May 2 qualify for reduced rates.

Although field and laboratory activities continue without stopping for the 16-day period, volunteers may participate for a single day or the entire time. Participants must be at least 10 years of age, and those younger than 14 must plan to work with a parent or other sponsoring adult at all times.
