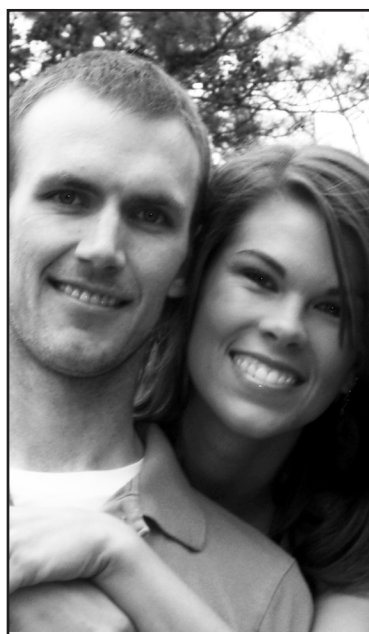
He was preceded in death by his father and a niece, Kendra Renee Dunlap.

Brownville School marker dedicated

Sunday, May 25, 2008 was a day that all Brownville Alumni will never forget, said Nadine Kammer, one of the organizers for the marker ceremony.

The dedication celebration was held for the erection of a Brownville school marker, she said, with about 90 people attending.

"Bill Selby introduced Thomas County Sheriff and Mayor of Brewster Mike Baughn, who is a great historian," Kammer said. "Mike was the spokesman for the dedication and related many interesting facts about the Brownville School and community."

Lucille Kammer Smith was recognized as the oldest living graduate.

"Lucille graduated with the Class of 1929," she said. "Ilene Deane, Wheat Ridge, Colo. and Ceci Allen of Brewster, were the only former teachers in attendance."

Twenty-one students who were graduates or attended Brownville, were also present at the ceremony.

Following Baughn's address, Kammer said she gave special recognition and "thanks" to the Ross Cranston family for donating the site for the marker and for doing the clean-up of the demolished building.

"What makes this marker so unique is that Ross and his family were able to save the two front steps of the original building," she said.

The marker is mounted on the school foundation to the back of the steps.

"The Brownville Alumni are also grateful to the entire Cranston family for using the funds from the Rex Cranston Memorial Fund for making this such a beautiful site with the addition of a new sidewalk, a limestone post and rail fence, and trees," she said.

Kammer designed the marker and it was made and mounted by Daren Lang of the Kansas Monument Company in Victoria.

"I appreciate all the Brownville Alumni Association, friends and some local businesses for their contributions to the Brownville School Fund," she said.

"This money and the generous funds from the Cranston family made it possible to have this awesome tribute to the Brownville School and Community."

The ceremony closed with Brownville Alumni Association secretary, Nadine Hockett of Colorado Springs, leading everyone in singing the Brownville

School Song, *Brownville Will Shine Tonight*.

"Brownville will not only shine tonight," Kammer said, "but it will shine forever."

In Thursday's edition of the *Free Press*, the Brownville Alumni Reunion, which was held the same day as the dedication, will be highlighted.

Fake tastes great

Dear Heloise: Many years ago, I knew of a recipe for mock apple pie that looked and tasted like real apple pie. No one would know it unless you said no apples were used. I lost my copy of that recipe. I hope you have one in your files. — Joseph May, Anaheim, Calif.

Yes, I have it. And you're right, people won't know if you don't tell. It is one of my most-requested recipes. You'd swear it was filled with apples. To make it, you'll need:

- * Pastry for a double-crust 9-inch pie
 - * 2 cups water
 - * 1 1/4 cups sugar
 - * 2 teaspoons cream of tartar
 - * 20 single-stack, square soda crackers (regular, salted)
 - * Butter (for dotting)
 - * Ground cinnamon (for sprinkling)
- Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Line the bottom of a 9-inch pie pan with pastry. In a medium saucepan, boil the water, sugar and cream of tartar.

Add the soda crackers and boil for only 1 minute. Spoon the mixture gently into the pie shell. Dot the top with butter and sprinkle on the cinnamon to taste. Cover the pie

with the top crust and cut vents into it. Bake for 35 minutes. Let the pie cool completely before cutting, so it has time to firm up.

So, there you go, Joseph. Enjoy and hang on to the recipe. I'm sure you'll be getting a lot of requests for it. FYI: When baking pie, protect the outer edge of the pie crust from burning by putting a thin strip of aluminum foil over it.

Remove for the last 15 minutes of baking.
