Norton BB gun team places seventh at nationals

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The Norton County Rotary BB Gun Team proved once again that the local shooting education and gun safety program is one of the best by placing seventh in the 43rd annual U.S. Jaycees/Daisy International BB Gun Match Championships held over the weekend on the campus of Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green, Ky. Thirty-three teams were involved.

The young Norton County girl and boy marksmen have qualified at the state level and competed 40 years in the international shoot, the largest junior marksmanship competition in the world. Norton has won the international championship eight times, more than any other team in the world. Despite the fact that every year's team consists of different shooters due to the rule that no shooter can compete in consecutive years, Norton is almost always in the hunt for the international title and a top ten finisher.

This year's squad was equally proficient in recording a total score in the shooting positions of prone, standing, sitting and kneeling and written test of 2,336. Last year's Norton team finished fifth overall with a score of 2,319, which was night's rest on Saturday after the 17 points less and is indicative of the toughness of this year's competition.

Pierre, South Dakota, won the championship with 1,886 shooting, 496 written test, total of 2,382, followed by Washington, Missouri, 1,885 shooting, 486 written test, total of 2,371; Spink County, South Dakota, 1,868 shooting, 490 written test, total of 2,358; Back Woods Bunch from Georgia, 1,861 shooting, 492 written test, total of 2,353; Gallatin, Montana, 1,869 shooting, 482 written test, total of 2,351; Palmyra, Pennsylvania, 1,856 shooting, 486 written test, total of 2,342; Norton County, 1,852 shooting, 484 written test, total of 2,336; Timber Beasts, Forest Grove, Oregon, 1,843 shooting, 492 written test, total of 2,335; Wyandotte County Kansas, 1,844 shooting, 490 written test, total of 2,334 and Ft. Bend, Texas, 1,851 shooting, 474 written test, total of 2,325 to round out the top ten.

The quality of the marksmanship in Kansas and South Dakota is evidenced by the fact both states

had two teams in the top ten.

Four other Kansas teams competed. Derby was 16th with a total score of 2,303; Lyon County placed 26th with a score of 2,197; Jefferson County was 29th with a score of 2,175 and Phillips/Rooks County was 31st with a 2,147.

The young marksmen must be between 8 and 15 years of age. Each of the four shooting positions counts as 20 percent of a shooter's score and the written test on marksmanship and gun safety counts for the other 20 percent. The written test contained questions on information from the Daisy 10-Lesson Curriculum Guide and the NRA 5 Meter BB Gun Rule book.

Following the opening ceremonies on Friday evening, shooting began Saturday morning in Diddle Arena at Western Kentucky University with firing from the prone position. The young Blue Jays shot a 476 to tie for sixth in prone. Next, they shot from the tough standing position and scored a 435 to tie for 15th.

In the afternoon, the shooters took the written test and results were not released until after the sitting and kneeling competition on Sunday afternoon.

The Norton shooters got a good annual Barter Bar and were bright eyed and relaxed on Sunday morning when they fired from the sitting position. Norton was as good as anyone in that position and better than all but the Spink County, S.D. team, who edged them by just one point. Norton shot an astounding 482 and Spink County a 483. To put this in perspective, only one other team shot a better score in the much easier prone position. Washington, Mo. had a 485 in prone and Pierre, S.D., the eventual champion, shot a 482 in

After Norton's tremendous performance from the sitting position, the young Blue Jays were tied for sixth, just two points out of fifth.

Norton dropped to a 459 in the tougher kneeling position which tied them for 11th in that position and placed them seventh overall in shooting.

The young Blue Jays' excellent 484 in the written test tied with three other teams for ninth best but they still placed seventh overall.

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
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


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
