Jayhawks hope to improve their running game this week

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Kansas has a running game?

The 16th-ranked Jayhawks do, in fact, run the football.

Their ground game just seems invisible so far.

Kansas (3-1) is averaging just 119 yards rushing a game, on a paltry 3.4 yards per carry. The Jayhawks have been able to make do so far by relying largely on star quarterback Todd Reesing, but even teams in the high-flying Big 12 must show some semblance of a running attack.

That's why the Jayhawks, who open Big 12 play at Iowa State (2-2) on Saturday, spent their bye week trying to shore up a lagging ground game.

"Practices were long and they were tough. We pushed ourselves to the limits and tried to do whatever we could to get the running game going," Kansas running back Angus Quigley said. "We knew we had to get better. We are nowhere near where we need to
