Society to induct members

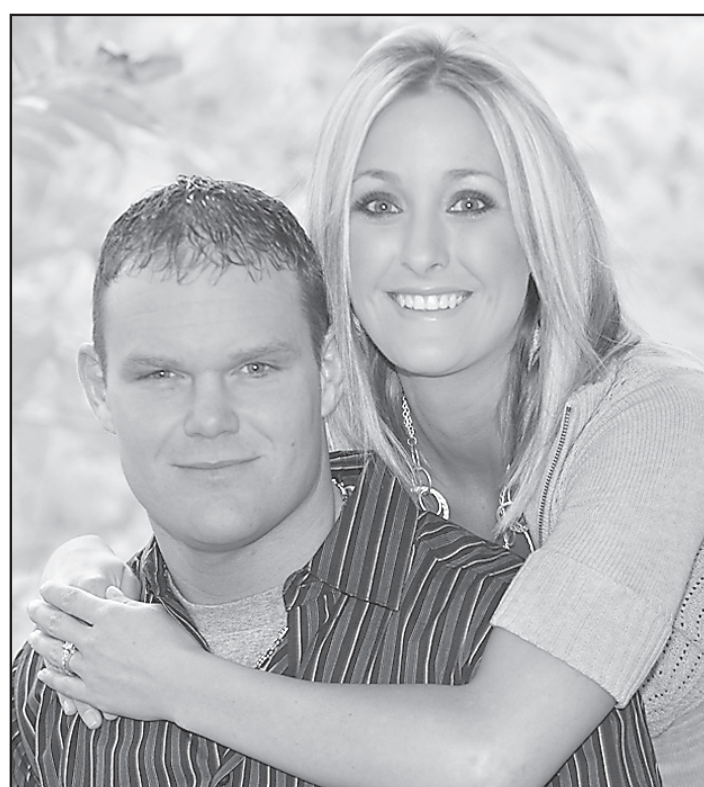

Disaster declaration sought

Gov. Kathleen Sebelius asked U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Ed Schafer on Thursday to declare Sherman County an agricultural disaster area for crop losses due to severe weather between January and August.

"Weather events impacted crop production in Sherman County to the extent it meets the criteria to be declared a disaster area," Sebelius

said. "A disaster declaration will ensure Kansas farmers are eligible to seek aid should they need it."

The severe weather included drought, heat, winds and hail, which hurt corn, sorghum, wheat, sunflower and pasture production. Hail also damaged farm buildings and irrigation equipment, the governor said.

A disaster designation from

Schafer will make farmers and ranchers eligible for low-interest loans, plus any aid that may be available under the permanent disaster program in the new farm bill.

A federal declaration usually allows farmers in adjacent counties to file disaster claims related to the same events.
