Freda Katherine Marie Pabst Thieler

Freda Katherine Marie Pabst Thieler, 94, of Colby, died November 30, 2008, at Golden Living Center in Downs. Freda was born June 12, 1914 in Thayer County, Nebraska to Conrad and Francie (Buhs) Pabst, the sixth of eight children. At six years of age, the family moved from Gilead, NE to a farm south of Halford. Freda graduated from the eighth grade in Halford and from Colby High School with the class of 1933.

Freda married Cleo E. Thieler on December 25, 1935 and resided on a farm southeast of Colby. To this union were born Harry and Marlene. After the death of Cleo in 1969, Freda remained on the farm taking care of the farming and cattle; however, after the death of Harry in 1970, Freda sold the farm and moved into Colby. In November of 2002, at the age of 88, Freda sold her home and moved to Fairview Retirement Estates. In September 2007, Freda moved to the Golden Living Center in Downs.

Freda was baptized into the Lutheran faith in June 1914 in Nebraska. She was confirmed with the first confirmation class at Trinity Lutheran Church in Colby on April 14, 1935. Up until the time of her death, she was the oldest living member from the originating congregation of Trinity Lutheran Church. She held offices in Lutheran Women's Missionary League, served as secretary-treasurer for Aid Association for Lutherans from 1976-1980 and Historian from 1975-2000. In 1995, Freda was one of twenty-four individuals who took a two-week tour of Greece and the Holy Land. Freda was faithful in reading her Bible and portals of prayer which were always laced with her personal devotional notes. Any guests to her home would see these books on the end table next to her chair in the living room, for she always wanted to be near her God.

Freda began her life as a daughter and sister but grew into a wife, mother, aunt, grandmother, and great-grandmother. Through the years, she was not a person to remain idle. She mowed her lawn until her mid 80's and manicured her flowers and garden to perfection. When arriving at Freda's house, she was quick to give the home and garden tour before sitting down to visit. For many years Colby Community College welcomed Freda every morning for aerobics and aquatic exercises. On the flip side of the health endorsement aspect, Freda worked at Daylight Donuts far past retirement age and instantly became a hit when she had a few donuts on hand for the grand kids. Speaking of food, she was an excellent cook. She was well known for her homemade angel food cake, noodles, no bake cookies, cherry winks, pumpkin pie, and peppernuts. Her flawless skills also extended into her dog pillows and exquisite quilts. Whether it be for a wedding, baby, graduation, Christmas, or just for love, Freda made each of us several quilts that we will cherish forever. Our grandma Freda leaves our hearts with many memories that will bring us joy beyond these immediate days of sorrow. We will always remember her candy drawer, her fine taste in clothing and jewelry, her generosity, and least we not forget that grandma never colored her hair. She was truly beautiful inside and out. Tucked away in her belongings we found a statement that she had cut out of her devotional reading. It states, "What is a mother? A mother is a link to God - a child's first impression of God and first awareness of God's Love comes from a mother." Grandma, you have been our link to God. May he continue to wrap you in his arms. We are blessed to have been loved by you. We'll see you on the other side!

Freda was preceded in death by her husband Cleo, son Harry, parents Conrad & Francie Pabst, brothers Bill Herman, Ed, Hie and Paul and sisters Alvina and Ethel.

Funeral services were held December 5, 2008 at 10:30 a.m. at the Trinity Lutheran Church in Colby, KS with Pastor John Schmidt officiating.
