The Pioneer Memorial Library is preparing to begin the Food for Fines campaign.

Just last week I was asked what this was all about. A simple poem written by Shel Silverstein and found in the book, "A Light in the Attic," might help explain the gist of the campaign:

Overdues: What do I do? What do I do? This library book is 42 years overdue. I admit that it's mine. But I can't pay the fine. Should I turn it in or hide it again? What do I do? What do I do?

To this, we of the library staff say to you – Don't worry, turn in cans of food for your fines!

Food for Fines has been done off and on at the library, since 1985, at least. A patron who has overdue books may bring in canned food to redeem any fines on his or her account. We ask that the food have current dates, have labels intact and be in good condition.

During this time of economic upheaval, we think that Food for Fines will enable those patrons who are struggling to make ends meet find a way to pay their overdue fines without really hurting their pocket book. If you want to redeem your library fines, please



simply take your food items to the front desk, tell the librarian your book revolves around who dun-it. name and that you wish to give food for your fines.

We will then have you place the food in a basket trimmed in holiday material that has a sign that says "Food for Fines." Remember to tell the librarian, don't just leave food, or you will not get the credit. We will then donate those canned goods to Genesis-Thomas Countyfood bank. Food for Fines campaign will begin Monday and end Tuesday, Dec. 23.


