Not me, though. I always try to get ready in that week prior to the opening game. Quite honestly, it seems like kids have gotten a lot faster over the years. Or maybe I'm just getting slower. Whatever the case, I love the game, and all the aches and pains are well worth

Officiating has been a big part of my life for many years, even though there have been times when it has been no fun at all. But the good outweighs the bad by quite a ways.

I'm just like any official; there are certain calls over the years I wish I had back. But there are also the games that I am very proud of. Many people wonder why would anybody want to be an official. Why would anyone want to purposely add more stress into their already busy and hectic lives?

I just recently read an article in the "Official's Quarterly" magazine from a retired basketball official by the name of Jerry Sulecki. Jerry had retired from officiating after 30 years. In his article he explained what he had learned from the whole officiating experience. If I were to retire, I feel like I would feel exactly the same about many of the things he discussed.

patient and understanding his officiating was probably the most family had been to allow him to indulge himself for so long. He recognized he had been and still was in many ways, part of another family. He realized he had participated in a truly noble avocation, helping shape and mold lives of young athletes.

Jerry also recognized that not just anyone can officiate. It takes a special person. When we put on the stripes, we are expected to be perfect. We find out who we are every time we step on the court and that takes backbone, fortitude and moral fiber.

Jerry found there are people who've never blown a whistle telling us what's wrong with officiating all the time, and it's obvious to them anyone could do a better job, but they can't. He explains that as an official we have to be extra careful in what we say and do at all times, because there is always someone watching us.

Jerry found out after 30 years that he didn't want to take the uniform off. He loved the uniform; it put him in charge of something, if only for a brief time. While taking the game and its effects on the participants very seriously, he always tried to have fun while officiating.

He also acknowledged all the fine people he had met, all the free exercise he had gotten, all the great athletes he had officiated and all the gyms he knew how to get to. Jerry also came to realize that besides marrying his wife and

He said he came to realize how seeing his children grow up, that satisfying single thing he had done in his life. Lastly, Jerry's greatest lesson he had learned after retiring is to enjoy what you are doing right now while you still can. Nothing in life is guaranteed, he

said; nothing in life is forever. I thought he made some great points in his article, and I can't help but think most officials would feel the same as Jerry when the day comes for them to give it up. It's currently getting harder and harder to recruit new quality officials, and many young officials quit because of the abuse they take from the fans.

The only way to get better as an official is to work as many games as you can those first few years. I'm a huge fan of loud gymnasiums and loud fan support, because the louder the gym, usually the better the game. A silent gymnasium is usually a sign of a not-sogood basketball game.

As you head out to watch your favorite team this winter, just remember that while hollering at the officials is part of the game, being disrespectful to them is not. I wish you and your team the best of luck. We will see you on the
