Lady Eagles win tourney

The Colby High girls basketball team just keeps on winning. After losing 3 of their first 4 games the Lady Eagles have ticked off eight straight wins.

"We're finally meshing as a team," said senior Taylor Young.

The Lady Eagles eighth straight win did not come easily. Colby needed one overtime to defeat Pine Creek 48-39 in the finals of the Paul Wintz/Tom Bowen Orange and Black Basketball Classic.

Pine Creek was able to get some good looks inside early in the second quarter helping them gain a five point lead over Colby. A little later in the quarter Sophomore Kayla Hockersmith made a driving lay-up while being fouled. She knocked down the free throw to cut Pine Creek's lead to 13-11. Minutes later she made another bucket to give the Lady Eagles a 14-13 lead with less than five minutes remaining in the second quarter.

neck with only a few minutes left in the fourth quarter. Young was fouled with a little over a minute remaining and the game knotted at 34. She hit 1 of 2 free throws to give the Lady Eagles a one point lead. Pine Creek threw the ball away on their next possession. They quickly made up for their mistake by intercepting Colby's inbound pass and fast breaking down the court for a lay-up.

On the Lady Eagles next possession Bell was fouled while taking a shot below the free throw line. She would connect on 1 of 2 free throws to tie the game at 36. Pine Creek would commit another turnover giving the Eagles a chance to take the lead and win the game. Colby was able to get a few good looks at the basket, but both shots were off the mark and the contest headed into overtime.

Hockersmith nailed a mid-range jumper to give Colby a 38-36 lead to start the overtime. On the Lady Eagles next possession Young was fouled while trying to score off a missed shot. She hit both of her

Liberal's fast breaking offense combined with the fabulous play of the Redskins Devin Levingston proved to be too much for the Colby High boys basketball team as the Eagles fell to Liberal 55-41 in the finals of the 24th annual Paul Wintz/Tom Bowen Orange and Black Basketball Classic.

The first quarter went back and forth with neither team gaining a clear advantage. Senior Levi Schlick looked sharp nailing a jumper and making some tough shots inside. The Redskins took advantage of their quickness advantage by fast breaking on the Eagles for some easy transition buckets. At the end of the first quarter Colby trailed Liberal 16-14.


