This year's benefit, "How the West Was Fun," will be Saturday, April 4, at the City Limits Convention Center.


Last year's auction netted a little over \$60,000 for scholarships, Wells said, and the foundation hopes to surpass that total this year.

# Chautauqua's final program explores 1930s personalities

this summer's "Bright Dreams, Hard Times: America in the Thirties" Chautauqua will be Ottawa on June 3-7 and Hesston June 10-

This same program will be in Colby at the Prairie Museum of Art and History from June 10 to 16 in 2010. Museum Administrator Sue Taylor said this will be the last year for the Chautauqua.

"Canceling the Chautauqua program," said Tracy Quillin, director of community information for the Kansas Humanities Council, "was a result of the Kansas Humanities board doing some strategic planning to discontinue some of the old programs and develop new ones.

The "festival of learning," as it is billed, is a partnership this year between the Kansas and Nebraska Humanities councils, the Franklin County Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Hesston Chautauqua Committee, using a "We the People" grant from the National

The event also features daily grams, including a Youth Chautauqua Camp. At the five-day camp, students in grades 5-8 will be historians, researchers, and scriptwriters as they prepare to present their own historical characters on Friday evening.


